Waterfest 2021

Itasca Waters hosted Waterfest 2021, a community celebration in honor of Itasca County's clean water resources, on August 6 on the banks of the Mississippi River. Waterfest was made possible through a Community Innovation Grant from the Bush Foundation. The free riverside event took place at the KAXE amphitheater, and 250 people participated in the celebration.

From the late afternoon and into the evening, event goers experienced a variety of entertainment: a dance dedicated to the water performed by the Reif Center Dancers; a skit by Brookhouse Productions addressing water related issues; and live musical performances by John Downing and Holly Christenson and Brothers Burn Mountain.

Food and beverages were plentiful, and guests received swag bags chock full of free educational materials highlighting easy ways all people can take action to preserve and maintain water quality in Itasca County's lakes, rivers and streams.

Waterfest also marked the Clean Water Initiative kickoff, an Itasca Waters initiative focused on organizing key stakeholders around the county to identify and implement strategic actions to address the top three shoreline best practices: 1) preserving and restoring natural shoreline vegetation to reduce runoff and repair shoreline erosion; 2) curbing pollution by reducing phosphorus and other pollutants; and 3) stopping the spread of aquatic invasive species.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT FOR STRATEGIC PLANNING SERVICES

This Agreement is made between Itasca Waters (the "Client") and unTapped, LLC (the "Consultant") for professional services according to the following terms, conditions and provisions.

Work to be Performed (Deliverables)

Consultant will provide the following services: Organize and implement the Clean Water Initiative.

1) Identify and analyze target audiences

Consultant will develop a priority ranking of lake associations with whom to engage based on need and preparedness.

2) Recruit lake associations to join the Clean Water Initiative

Once the lake associations agree to participate in the Clean Water Initiative, Consultant will work with them to implement strategic actions addressing the top three shoreland best practices:

- Reduce runoff and repair shoreline erosion by preserving or restoring natural shoreline vegetation
- Curb pollution: Reduce phosphorus and other pollutants
- Stop the Spread of Aquatic Invasive Species

3) Create messages for target audiences

Consultant will tailor communications to the values that will have the most impact in changing behavior (money savings, time savings, improving ecosystems, improving property owners' quality of life, enhancing economic benefits).

4) Create awareness and provide information

Consultant will work with association leadership to identify their objectives, existing initiatives, and gauge their willingness to participate. After the groundwork is established, Consultant will work with the associations on implementation plans that meet their needs.

5) Prepare materials for target audiences

Consultant will prepare print and online materials (fact sheets, brochures, flyers, booklets, infographics) and work with association networks to distribute them (direct mail, e-mail, and physical distribution at lake association meetings).

All services shall be preformed to the best of Consultant's ability, and Consultant will devote such time, energy and skills as are necessary to the orderly and efficient dispatch of their responsibilities hereunder and all presentations and other communications shall be performed in a professional manner which preserves and expands the reputation and goodwill associated with Itasca Waters.



Terms of Agreement

This Agreement will be effective on the date the contract is signed by unTapped and Itasca Waters and will remain in effect until successful completion of all work to be performed, unless either party gives 15 days prior written notice to the other of intent to terminate without cause.

Compensation and Reimbursement of Expenses

As full consideration for the provision of the above services, Itasca Waters will pay Consultant in the amount \$15,000.





This letter describes our expectations for creating a geologic atlas of Itasca County. The atlas will provide objective information useful to understanding and managing the natural resources of your county. Although this arrangement does not involve any transfer of funds between Itasca County and the Minnesota Geological Survey (MGS), it will require both parties to expend resources and effort, and both must successfully complete certain tasks to attain the goals of the project.

I wish to be clear that all MGS participation is dependent on funding from the Legislative and Citizen's Commission on Minnesota Resources (LCCMR), or other State sources. If that funding is not provided, or is not sufficient, the project will not be completed. Such funding is anticipated at this time.

Itasca County Environmental Services, or other local parties, will establish accurate locations for water wells for which construction records are available. Staff of the Minnesota Geological Survey will review the locations to ensure they meet standards, and MGS will conduct quality checks to assure the accuracy of the locations.

The MGS will provide comprehensive geologic mapping and associated databases for Itasca County. This will likely include maps of the bedrock geology, bedrock topography, surficial geology, thickness of the glacial materials, and also illustrations or other means to describe the glacial materials between the land surface and the bedrock surface. The completeness and resolution of these maps and databases are dependent on the distribution of data, mostly from the water well records. MGS will deliver these products as printed plates, as portable document files (pdfs), and as geographic information system files.

The County Geologic Atlas Program has been continuously funded for over 30 years, and we have no reason to expect a disruption. However, the delivery date for products is funding dependent. We are generally able to deliver our products in about 4-5 years from the date when

MGS begins work in the county. While locating can start immediately, MGS work will not likely begin until the summer 2023 field season.

A complete atlas is made up of two parts – geology (prepared by MGS) plus groundwater (prepared by DNR). Following the completion of the geologic mapping by MGS, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources will begin work on the groundwater portion of the atlas. The groundwater atlas provides detailed information specifically about groundwater resources of the county including availability, pollution sensitivity, recharge areas, chemistry, surface water and groundwater connections and groundwater flow pathways. The groundwater atlas is another long-standing aspect of the program, but MGS cannot guarantee funding or participation by DNR at this point. DNR will be in contact as the project progresses.

I believe that this project will provide information essential to managing the water and mineral resources of Itasca County, to the benefit of its citizens. I appreciate your willingness to share this work with us. Please indicate your agreement with the expectations above by signature, and return one copy to me. Thank you for your support of this project.

Donations: Total membership donations received in 2020 were \$9,969 with \$3,575.00 so far in 2021. We've received eleven new memberships in 2021, five from new lakeshore owners who received a Shoreland Guide and one from Waterfest.

Waterfest Booth: We had a very positive response at our membership table. We missed a few donations because we did not have credit card capability, so we need to add that for future events. We handed out 29 well water testing kits, gave away a lot of lead-free tackle, held a drawing for three youth fishing poles, and Bob Conzemius was the winner of the rain barrel drawing.

Welcome to the Lake *Shoreland Guide* **mailing:** Paula mailed 55 Shoreland Guides in April for the first quarter of 2021 and is working on the next group.

Fall membership campaign: To be sent out about November 1st. **Online Donation Button:** PCI compliance has been validated through September 2022.

Fishing line disposal project: Thirteen containers were made and placed at the following locations:

- 4 containers for City of Grand Rapids: Forest Lake, Crystal (Ice) Lake, Sylvan Bay, Mississippi River by the Library
- 2 containers for City of Cohasset: Mississippi River and Tioga Beach
- 1 container for City of Coleraine: Trout Lake
- 2 containers for Scenic State Park
- 3 containers for USGS: Pokegama and Winnie Lake Dams
 - They reported that containers seem to be working well, and line has been collected from all of them.
- State of MN-DNR Wildlife: Mud Lake Dam
